



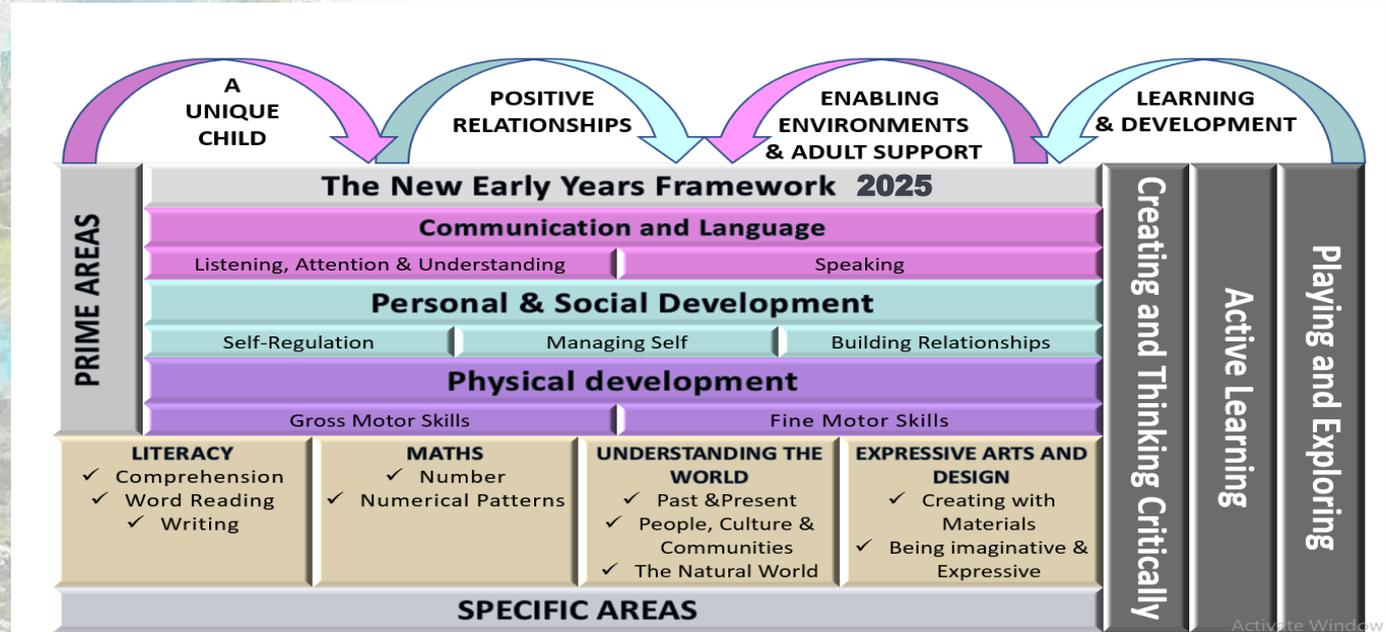

# Intent, Implementation & Impact

<p>Intent (Curriculum)</p>	<p>We will provide a safe, nurturing and stimulating environment which supports the growth of communication and language, independence, resilience, collaboration and a love of learning. We will facilitate progression and achievement of developmental milestones through learning attitudes fostered through the development of children's Characteristics of Effective Learning. Each child is valued and enabled to achieve the highest possible outcomes, developing strong foundations for 'learning and life readiness'.</p>
<p>Implementation (Pedagogy)</p>	<p>High quality planning will ensure breadth and depth of learning allowing children to develop their communication, physical, intellectual, emotional &amp; social skills through an abundance of play opportunities. High quality interactions through planned adult-led, guided and child initiated activities within enabling environments both indoors and outdoors will provide opportunities to experience awe and wonder, develop curiosity, knowledge and understanding of the community and wider world broadening their minds and outlook on life, building cultural capital.</p>
<p>Impact (Assessment)</p>	<p>Through on-going observations, formative and summative assessments children's progress will be tracked from baseline at Nursery entrance through to ELGs at the end of Reception. These assessments will inform next step planning and judgements (demonstrated through Learning Journals, books and pupil voice) and will be validated through a planned process of school and consortium moderation. An annual report to parents will summarise each child's achievements along side termly parent consultations.</p>

## Characteristics of Effective Learning

**Playing and exploring:** - Children investigate and experience things, and 'have a go'. Children who actively participate in their own play develop a larger store of information and experiences to draw on which positively supports their learning

**Active learning:** - Children concentrate and keep on trying if they encounter difficulties. They are proud of their own achievements. For children to develop into self-regulating, lifelong learners they are required to take ownership, accept challenges and learn persistence.

**Creating and thinking critically:** - Children develop their own ideas and make links between these ideas. They think flexibly and rationally, drawing on previous experiences which help them to solve problems and reach conclusions.

*PLAY: At Welford On Avon, we understand that children learn best when they are absorbed, interested and active. We understand that young children benefit from a balanced curriculum which includes teaching that's been planned ahead and also makes time for their spontaneous learning. Children need organised, adult-led guided learning to bring new ideas and experiences to their lives. They need well-planned, specific learning experiences. These will deepen and consolidate their learning over time. We understand that active learning involves other children, adults, objects, ideas, stimuli and events that aim to engage and involve children for sustained periods. We believe that Early Years education should be as practical as possible and therefore, we are proud that our EYFS setting provides consistent opportunities for children to learn through play. PLAY is essential for children's development across all areas. Play builds on children's confidence as they learn to explore, to relate to others around them and develop relationships, set their own goals and solve problems. Children learn by leading their own play and by taking part in play which is guided by adults.'. EYFS Team*

<p><b>Communication and Language</b></p> <p>We will talk to parents about what language they speak at home, try and learn a few key words and celebrate multilingualism</p>	<p>The development of children’s spoken language underpins all seven areas of learning and development. Children’s <b>back-and-forth interactions</b> from an early age form the foundations for language and cognitive development. The number and quality of the conversations they have with adults and peers throughout the day in a <b>language-rich environment</b> is crucial. By commenting on what children are interested in or doing, and echoing back what they say with <b>new vocabulary added</b>, practitioners will build children's language effectively. <b>Reading frequently to children, and engaging them actively in stories</b>, non-fiction, rhymes and poems, and then providing them with extensive opportunities to use and <b>embed new words in a range of contexts</b>, will give children the opportunity to thrive. Through <b>conversation, story-telling and role play</b>, where children <b>share their ideas</b> with support and <b>modelling</b> from their teacher, and sensitive questioning that invites them to elaborate, children become comfortable using a <b>rich range of vocabulary and language structures</b>.</p>					
<p><b>Ongoing development of listening, attention and understanding; Speaking.</b></p>	<p>Whole EYFS Focus – C&amp;L is developed throughout the year through high quality interactions, daily meet and greet, daily group discussions, sharing circles, PSED times, stories, daily story time, daily rhyme/song times, singing, speech and language interventions, social snack time (with adults joining the children and modelling conversation skills), EYFS productions, assemblies and weekly interventions. <u>Specific vocabulary focus is highlighted in daily planning.</u></p>

<b>Managing Self - Regulation Building Relationships</b> 	<p>Children's personal, social and emotional development (PSED) is <b>crucial for children to lead healthy and happy lives</b>, and is fundamental to their cognitive development. Underpinning their personal development are the important attachments that <b>shape their social world</b>. Strong, warm and supportive relationships with adults, enable children to learn how to <b>understand their own feelings and those of others</b>. Children will be supported to <b>develop emotional literacy, promote a positive sense of self, set themselves simple goals, have confidence in their own abilities and develop resilience and patience</b>. Through adult modelling and guidance, they will learn <b>how to look after their bodies, including healthy eating</b>, oral hygiene and manage personal needs independently. Through supported interaction with other children, they learn how to make good friendships, co-operate, skills for co-operative and collaborative interaction and resolve conflicts peaceably. These attributes will provide a secure platform from which <b>children can achieve at school and in later life</b>.</p>					
	<p>Show an understanding of their own feelings and those of others, and begin to <b>regulate their behaviour accordingly</b>. Set and work towards simple goals, being able to wait for what they want and <b>control their immediate impulses when appropriate</b>. <p><b>Physical development</b></p> <p><b>Handwriting</b> We follow Twinkl cursive loop handwriting scheme</p> <p>Continuously check the process of children's handwriting (pencil grip and letter formation, including directionality). Provide extra help and guidance when needed.</p>	<p>Physical activity is <b>vital</b> in children's all-round development, enabling them to <b>pursue happy, healthy and active lives</b>. Gross and fine motor experiences develop incrementally throughout early childhood, starting with <b>sensory explorations</b> and the development of a <b>child's strength, co-ordination and positional awareness</b> with both objects and adults. Through planned activity and opportunities for play both indoors and outdoors, we can support children to develop their <b>core strength, stability, balance, spatial awareness</b>, co-ordination and agility. Gross motor skills provide the foundation for developing healthy bodies and social and emotional well-being. <b>Fine motor control and precision helps with hand-eye co-ordination</b>, which is later linked to <b>early literacy</b>. Repeated and varied opportunities to explore and play with small world activities, puzzles, arts and crafts and the practice of using small tools (Busy Fingers), with feedback and support from adults, allow children to develop <b>proficiency, control and confidence</b>.</p> <p>Physical Development is valued and promoted through:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Weekly PE sessions using Get Set 4 PE</li> <li>• Capitalising on transition times to promote gross motor skills e.g. stand in the line on one leg.</li> <li>• Brain gym exercises throughout the day to promote crossing the midline.</li> <li>• Finger Gym Station to develop wrist and finger strength, finger isolation and pincer grip.</li> <li>• Offering a wide variety of mark making tools and equipment e.g. hole punches, various mark making tools, scissors etc. to support the development of muscle strength and the control and manipulation of real tools.</li> <li>• Using the outdoor area daily for Physical Development where large and small apparatus is planned, organised, displayed and available for children to use independently.</li> <li>• Equipping the outdoor area with resources to promote balance and upper body strength e.g. balance bikes, wheeled vehicles, large building blocks and crates.</li> <li>• Engage children in structured activities: guide them in what to draw, write or copy.</li> <li>• Fit for play -</li> <li>• Squiggle while you wriggle!</li> </ul>

<p>Reading is at the core of everything that we do!</p> <p>Whole EYFS Focus – C&amp;L is developed throughout the year through high quality interactions, daily group discussions, sharing circles, PSHE times, stories, singing, speech and language interventions, Pie Corbetts reading and poetry spines, Pathways, assemblies and weekly interventions.</p> <p>Daily story time</p>	<p>It is crucial for children to develop a life-long love of reading. Reading consists of two dimensions: language comprehension and word reading. Language comprehension (necessary for both reading and writing) starts from birth. It only develops when adults talk with children about the world around them and the books (stories and non-fiction) they read with them, and enjoy rhymes, poems and songs together. Skilled word reading, taught later, involves both the speedy working out of the pronunciation of unfamiliar printed words (decoding) and the speedy recognition of familiar printed words. Writing involves transcription (spelling and handwriting) and composition (articulating ideas and structuring them in speech, before writing).</p> <p>At Welford-on-Avon Nursery, reading and the enjoyment of books is highly valued and promoted through daily direct teaching in the form of Phonic sessions, Story and Rhyme Time and listening to children read. We develop enthusiastic emerging readers who take delight in listening to stories, enjoy reading for pleasure and know how to use text to find out information by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Teaching early knowledge and skills of reading</li> <li>• Fostering a love of books by sharing and talking about texts</li> <li>• Immersing children in sounds, words, rhythm, rhyme and song</li> <li>• Modelling the pleasure and joy that books provide</li> <li>• Demonstrating that text has meaning</li> <li>• Showing the characteristics of a fluent reader</li> </ul>

## Phonics

Little Wandle Synthetic Systematic Phonics Resource  
 We will provide experiences which build on children's existing knowledge and understanding in order to challenge, stimulate and extend their learning and development.

Children's phonological and phonemic awareness will develop through fun, engaging games and nursery rhymes. Developing these skills in Nursery will lay the best possible foundations for learning phonics in Reception.

There are two aspects to Foundations for Phonics: Rhyme time and Tuning into sounds.

- Rhyme time explores rhyme to build up a bank of shared language, develop children's understanding of the world and familiarity with the sounds in words.
- Tuning into sounds teaches phonological and phonemic awareness through games.

During the first half term, no sounds will be introduced—focus on Rhyme time and settling children into routines.

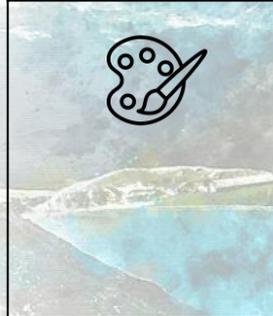

The development of children's artistic and cultural awareness supports **their imagination and creativity**. It is important that children have regular opportunities to **engage with the arts**, enabling them to explore and play with a wide range of **media and materials**. The quality and variety of what children see, hear and participate in is crucial for developing their understanding, **self-expression, vocabulary and ability to communicate through the arts**. The frequency, repetition and depth of their experiences are fundamental to their progress in interpreting and appreciating what they hear, respond to and observe.

Give children an insight into new musical worlds. Invite musicians in to play music to children and talk about it. Encourage children to listen attentively to music. Discuss changes and patterns as a piece of music develops.



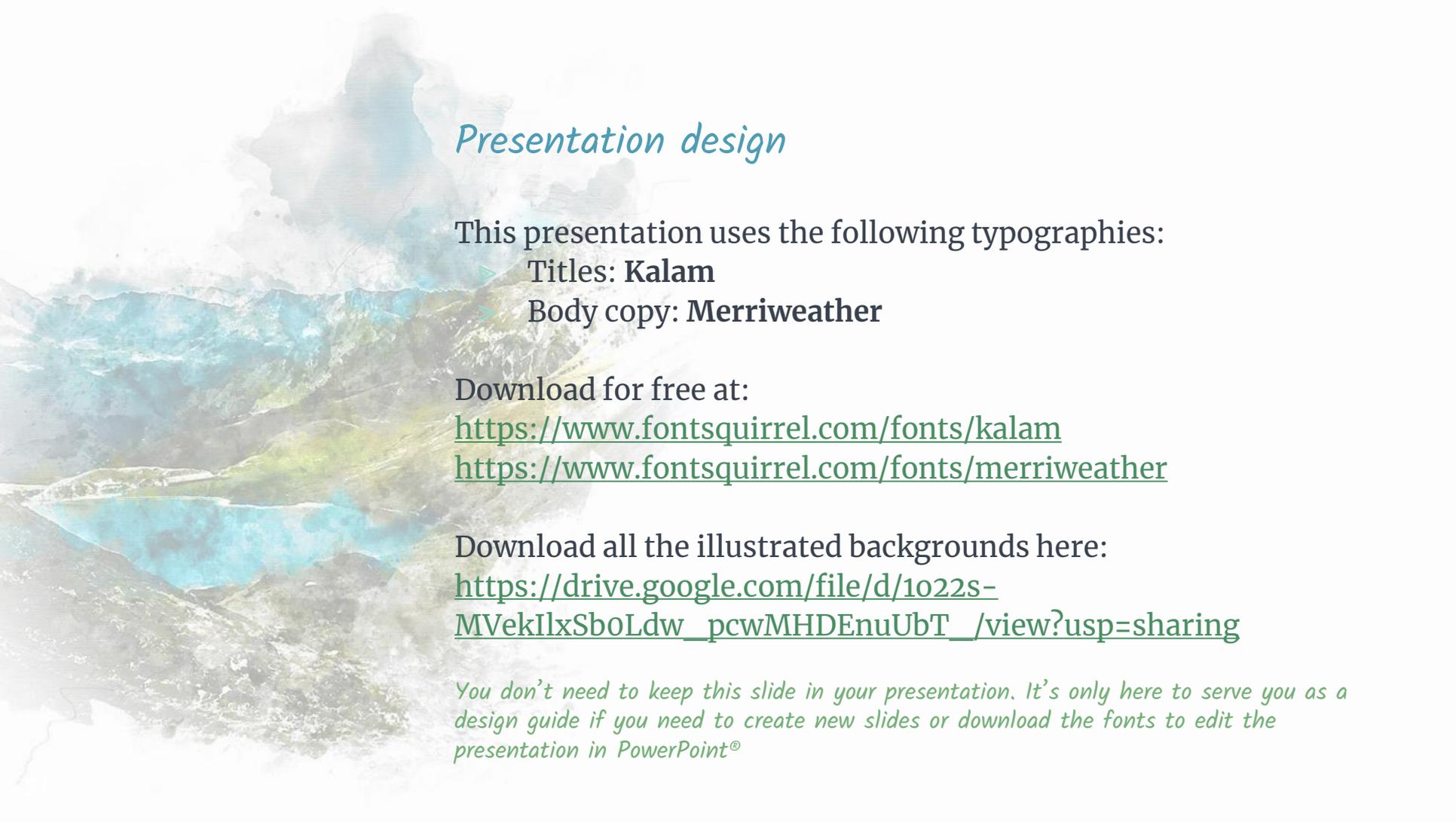

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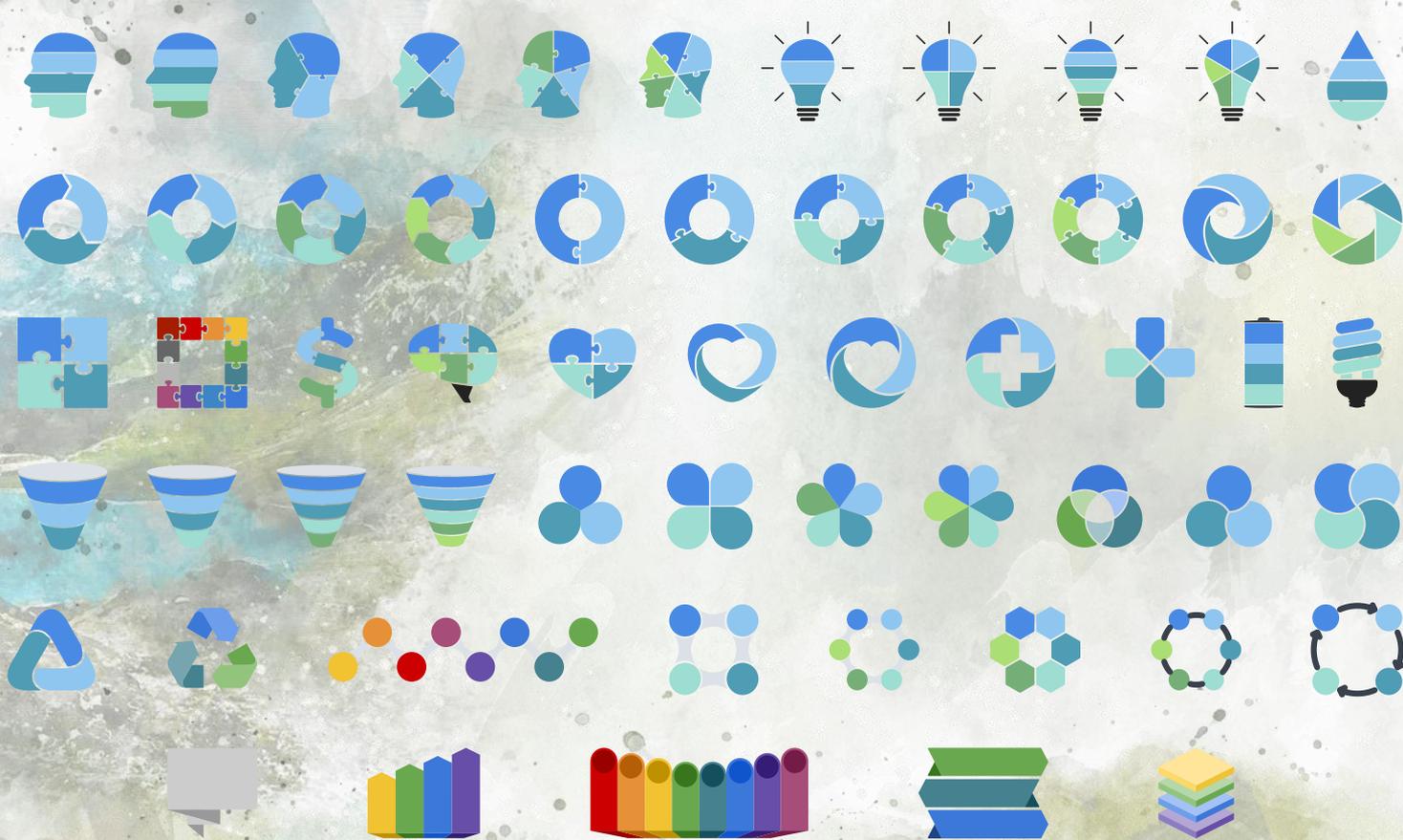
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
